

#### Dear Brother Knights,

We find ourselves in the midst of this Holy Season which accompanies the journey of the Christ towards the ultimate victory of life over sin and death. The empty tomb witnesses God's divine fulfillment of the covenant with Abraham, Issac, and Jacob. The Divine Son was sent to be the Savior of humanity. The Gospels relate the suffering accepted by Jesus that He might spare us from eternal judgment. Throughout the Eastertide they remind us of the appearances of Christ to his apostles and disciples.

What occurs after the Ascension is related to us about the mission of the early church in the Acts of the Apostles. (This is the only time in the liturgical calendar that the first reading is taken from the New Testament.)

It is important for us to recall that like Christmas, Easter is season which lasts from Sunday to the Feast of Pentecost. It is a perfect time for us to read this second work of Luke which is the historical account of Saints Peter and Paul as well as other disciples.

It tells of the sufferings of early believers. It is an intimate account of the workings of the Church and its needs. Again and again it gives witness to the presence of the Holy Spirit and how it accounts for the growth in the number of the faithful. It tells how the early leaders deal with issues at the first Council of Jerusalem. Conflicts were present but resolved through dialogue and prayer. In one case, we see the Apostles calling seven disciples to the mission of deacon to care for those who are poor and to contribute to the spread of the faithful.

As our Order has initiated Cor it is a wonderful opportunity to examine the context of the Acts. For those not yet acquainted with Cor it is appropriate to do a spiritual exercise reading of the origins of our Faith community.

Let us rejoice in the Risen Christ who died for us and has been raised for us.



#### **SUPPORT**

At a recent Fourth Degree Assembly, a Brother Sir Knight and I had a conversation about Vocations and what could be done to raise awareness of the need for additional men entering the Priesthood. The concern about a lack of youth involvement in our faith presented itself. In our discussion, he mentioned that the pastor of his parish experienced an uplifting conversation with several high school seniors who were interested in gathering to learn more about their Faith. While I'm not aware of whether anything has happened to date, it brought to mind that we as Knights might look to provide opportunity and support for activities that bring our youth closer to their faith and perhaps the Priesthood and religious life.

The following are random thoughts that could be developed. It is important that a priest would be present at these gatherings.

- Develop a program with your parish priest for High School juniors and seniors based on the Supreme Council's "CORE" Program. Its mission is to focus young Catholic men on Christ and strengthen them in faith and virtue through a commitment to prayer, formation and fraternity.



- Assist the parish or area local Young Catholic Adult group (Age 21 – 35) with their faith and social activities. Speakers, entertainment, refreshments are among the assistance that can be provided. Its mission to bring young men and women together in a Catholic atmosphere.



- Is there a college or university nearby? The council (or District or Chapter) can work with the Newman Club or School Chaplain with a variety of religious and social activities. An informal gathering over a cup of coffee with the chaplain can lead to discussions about Catholic family and priestly life.

The role of the Knights of Columbus can vary in many ways. It could range from the motivation to begin, provision of support and participation of Knights in the activities.

#### **REMINDERS**

It is not too late to join the RSVP program of the Supreme Council. Also remember, the RSVP program is also available to men and women who enter professed religious life as Nuns and Brothers. If a participant is needed, just call your Diocesan Vocation Office for help. The Supreme (<a href="www.kofc.org">www.kofc.org</a>) and State (<a href="www.nykofc.com">www.nykofc.com</a>) Websites are helpful as well.

Has your council established a relationship with your participant beyond a Check? If not a letter or invitation to a council event would show your interest and concern for their decision to be a priest.

Today, a vocation to married life is critical to our society and the future of our country. Does your council sponsor events, spiritual and social, that highlight strong Catholic family values?

# WHICH CAME FIRST?

# A Look at Easter's Holy and Worldly Symbols

The original Easter color was red, representing the blood of Christ. Today's Church Easter color is white. OLORS Hello pastels! Our wardrobes and our M&Ms take on a lighter, less saturated hue at this time of year.

Rabbits are a symbol of fertility and new life. Although not mentioned in the Gospel, it is likely these were borrowed from springtime pagan celebrations as symbols for Easter in the early days of Christianty.

At Easter, eggs represent Jesus' resurrection. In the 1200s, eggs were forbidden during Lent, so people would decorate them to mark the end of fasting and eat them at Easter.

Lilies were growing in the Garden of Gethsemane, where Jesus went to pray in his final days.

Jesus' death is likened to the sacrificial lamb of Passover. Jesus is often called the "Lamb of God."

The Paschal candle is lit to remind us Jesus is the light of the world.

The life cycle of the butterfly is a symbol of the Pascal Mystery: symbolizing Jesus' life, death, and resurrection.

The cross is the most well-known symbol of Christianity, although not originally understood by others. Some mocked it and said it was silly, but for Christians

it represents the power of Jesus' triumph and resurrection.

The Easter Bunny spreads joy (and candy) to children by delivering decorated eggs and other gifts. If you bite into a chocolate bunny this year you won't be alone — 90 million are produced each year.

Eggs have long been linked to pagan celebrations of spring (much like the rabbit). Today, the most popular Easter egg traditions include egg hunts and egg rolls.

Daffodils, tulips, and lilies bloom around Easter marking the coming of spring (and allergies!).

> Lamb is a traditional Easter dish, served as a main course or as a lamb-shaped cake for dessert.

Candles are lit to remember loved ones or those who are suffering.


Butterflies have long symbolized renewal or rebirth. There are about 15,000 to 20,000 species of butterflies worldwide.

The cross was used as a device of torture and painful public execution in ancient Roman times. Crucifixion was intended to not only kill its victim, but to terrorize

those who were a witness to the brutal and inhhumane act.

# New York Martyrs Shrine Officially Designated National Pilgrimage Site by U.S. Bishops



AURIESVILLE — Earlier this year, the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops announced that Our Lady of Martyrs Shrine in Auriesville has been designated as a national shrine for pilgrims by the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops. The Shrine was informed of its new official status by Father Dustin P. Doughty, executive director of Secretariat of Divine Worship for the U.S. Bishops, in a letter to Bishop Edward Scharbenberger of Albany, who, in a personal capacity, is chairman of the board of Friends of Our Lady of Martyrs, which runs the Shrine.

In August 2024, the Board of the Friends of Our Lady of Martyrs formally requested that the sanctuary be designated as a National Shrine.

Traditionally known as the National Shrine of the North American Martyrs, the National Shrine of Our Lady of Martyrs is located a short distance from the Empire State's capital region and about three hours by car from Manhattan, Boston, and Buffalo. It encompasses the former Ossernenon village where Jesuit priests Saints Isaac Jogues, René Goupil, and Jean de Lalande were martyred in the 1640s. It is also where convert St. Kateri Tekakwitha, known as "The Lily of the Mohawks," was born in 1656.

Opened in 1885, the Shrine has been administered for most of its history by a succession of Jesuit provinces in the northeastern United States and was formally owned by a non-profit corporation named Shrine of Our Lady of Martyrs, Inc.

In 2017, that foundation transferred the ownership of the Shrine to Friends of Our Lady of Martyrs, a non-profit corporation composed mainly of lay people, diocesan clergy, and other supporters of the Shrine, and chaired in a personal capacity by Bishop Scharfenberger. "We are delighted that the bishops have confirmed what the faithful have long instinctually known: The National Shrine of Our Lady of Martyrs is our home for the cultivation of holiness here in the U.S., Canada, and Mexico," Bishop Scharfenberger said.

"The inspiration of the martyrs in my upstate New York backyard was foundational to my own early calling to the priesthood," he continued. "To this day, I go to the Shrine as a pilgrim to refuel in prayer for God's outpouring of graces in my daily decisions and the lives of the faithful people the Church has entrusted to me."

In 1930, a year before Pope Pius XI canonized the eight North American Martyrs — the three who died in Auriesville and the five who died in Ontario, Canada — a church dubbed the "Coliseum" was built on the grounds of The Shrine.

Constructed according to the tradition of a Roman amphitheater where early Christian martyrs had yet been killed, the round, roofed Coliseum has 70 doors, symbolizing the 70 disciples whom Jesus sent out to proclaim the Gospel in every direction (see Lk 10:1). Built to seat over 8,000 people, it has the largest capacity of any Church building in the western hemisphere.

It was recently filled in October 2023 for the New York State Eucharistic Congress, which featured popular Catholic speakers Peter Kreeft, Supreme Knight of the Knights of Columbus Patrick Kelley, Bishop Joseph Espaillat of New York and Catholic Channel Sirius host Katie McGrady, among others. Julie Baaki, Executive Director of Our Lady of Martyrs Shrine, described the ongoing relevance of the Shrine.

"Pope Francis has said that there are more Christian martyrs in the world today than in the early Church," Baaki said. "Our National Shrine is a haven where pilgrims come to pray for our persecuted brothers and sisters throughout the world as well as for growth in courage for any trials we face as we try to live lives of virtue, grow in faith and try to pass it along.' "As a wife and mother," continued Baaki, "I see the fruits of my prayers to the Martyrs in everyday family life, and a superabundance of graces in the testimonies of faithful who visit. Even before this new designation, our Shrine has drawn multitudes from across the country to upstate New York to learn from the faith of the martyrs and Saint Kateri." Monsignor Roger Landry, National Director of the Pontifical Mission Societies in the U.S.A. and

a Board Member of Friends of Our Lady of Martyrs, said that the Shrine is a place where all Catholics are confirmed in the missionary dimension of the Christian life.


"As Pope Francis repeatedly teaches us, we Catholics do not just have a mission but are a mission. We have been entrusted by Jesus Christ with the completion of his saving mission on earth," he said.

"It's therefore impossible not to be impressed by the witness of the great missionary saints Isaac, Rene and Jean, who left their native France to bring the saving Gospel of Jesus and his real presence in the Eucharist to the native peoples of eastern Canada and New York. What they suffered out of love for Christ and for others inspires me and team at the Pontifical Mission Societies to try to support all those who are making similar sacrifices to share Christ and his word across the globe today," he said.

Landry, who has also served as a chaplain at the Shrine during its summer season, said that the new National Shrine, "because of its association with four great saints and heroes of our faith, probably is, after the tabernacles that adorn our Churches and the souls of newly baptized babies, the holiest place for Catholics in the country." He urged everyone to visit the Shrine to "experience its enormous spiritual riches" for themselves.

The National Shrine of Our Lady of Martyrs will begin its 2025 season on May 3 and will remain open through the feast day of the North American martyrs on October 19. 2025 is the centenary of the North American Martyrs' beatification. There is a novena to St. Kateri every July 6-14 leading up to her feast and another to the martyrs every October 11-19.

Considered one of the holiest sites in North America, the Shrine of Our Lady of Martyrs is especially important to Knights in New York, who have made annual pilgrimages there since 1938. In 2015, the New York State Council contributed \$100,000 to renovate the shrine, which had fallen into disrepair; the Supreme Council donated another \$500,000 to the restoration project. If you have never been there before we certainly encourage every Brother Knight who is able to attend to make every effort to do so!

## **MASS & STATUE DEDICATION**





## Prayer for the Canonization of Blessed Michael McGivney

God, our Father, protector of the poor and defender of the widow and orphan, you called your priest, Blessed Michael McGivney, to be an apostle of Christian family life and to lead the young to the generous service of their neighbor. Through the example of his life and virtue, may we follow your Son, Jesus Christ, more closely, fulfilling his commandment of charity and building up his Body which is the Church. Let the inspiration of your servant prompt us to greater confidence in your love so that we may continue his work of caring for the needy and the outcast. We humbly ask

that you glorify Blessed Michael McGivney on earth according to the design of your holy will.

Through his intersession, grant the favor I now present (here make your request).

Through Christ our Lord. Amen



The Father Michael J. McGivney Guild promotes the cause for sainthood of the founder of the Knights of Columbus, who was beatified on Oct. 31, 2020. Members of the Guild, and anyone devoted to Father McGivney, can play an active role in the cause by praying for his intercession in times of need, especially in cases of serious illness, and reporting to the Guild any favors received.

Membership in the Guild is free and open to anyone who is devoted to Father McGivney and wishes to invoke his intercession and assist in his sainthood cause through prayer. Members receive a quarterly newsletter and are remembered in a weekly Mass offered for their intentions.

Catholic men who wish to live out the vision and mission of Father McGivney are invited to join the Knights of Columbus and become part of a network of charity, unity and fraternity that serves local parishes and communities. Father McGivney founded the Knights of Columbus in 1882 in New Haven, Conn., and died at the age of 38 in 1890. His cause for sainthood was opened in 1997, and his heroic virtue was recognized by the Vatican in March 2008, when he was declared a Venerable Servant of God by Pope Benedict XVI.

On May 26, 2020, Father McGivney took another step toward sainthood when Pope Francis approved the promulgation of a decree recognizing a miracle attributed to his intercession. With the approval of this miracle, he was beatified on Oct. 31, 2020, with the title of Blessed.

Another miracle through his intercession is needed for him to be canonized as a saint.

Those devoted to Father McGivney are encouraged to recite regularly the prayer for his canonization, which is available online and on a special prayer card. You may Report favors through this website or by email or regular mail at the addresses listed below.
